CARES Act-Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF) Overview

- In March, Congress passed \$2 trillion CARES
 Act, which established the Coronavirus Relief
 Fund (CRF) to provide funding to state and
 local governments.
- Local governments with more than 500,000 residents received direct allocations from U.S. Treasury.
- On June 29, Governor Newsom allocated an additional amount of state CRF monies to local governments with fewer than 500,000 residents.
- Napa County received \$14.18 million, which will be distributed in 1/6 installments over a six month period by the Department of Finance.



CARES Act-Requirements

- Necessary expenditures incurred due to the COVID-19 public health emergency.
 - Direct response costs
 - Second order effects such as economic support
- Not accounted for in the most recently approved budget, except COVIDrelated supplemental appropriations or budget adjustments.
- Expenses incurred between March 1, 2020 and December 30, 2020.

Personnel Costs:

Costs through 6/30: \$3.3 M

Anticipated 7/1 – 12/30: **\$5.2 M**

Total: **\$8.5 M**

- Includes: force account labor (regular time and overtime), extra help contracts.
- CARES to cover regular time and costshare for FEMA eligible costs.
- Personnel managed through EOC; activities and time documented through payroll cost codes and on ICS forms.
- Variables: staffing pattern over time

Emergency Protective Measures:

Costs through 6/30: \$546 k

Anticipated 7/1 – 12/30: **\$3.18 M**

Total: **\$3.7 M**

- Includes: medical supplies, consumables, personal protective equipment, surge planning, communications, teleworking equipment, testing.
- CARES recommended to cover regular time and cost-share for FEMA eligible costs.
- Resources managed and tracked through EOC; documented through ICS forms.
- Variables: future of state-funded test sites

Non-Congregate Sheltering:

Costs through 6/30: **\$1.18 M**

Anticipated costs: 7/1 – 12/30: **\$3.61 M**

Total: **\$4.79 M**

- Includes: contracts with hotels to facilitate noncongregate sheltering of individuals who must comply with isolation and quarantine orders but cannot due to housing situation; services such as feeding, transportation, and sanitation; shelter for vulnerable homeless population in compliance with executive orders
- Variables: Project Homekey, other funding, variability of sheltering need and strategies

Other Personnel Costs:

Costs through 6/30: **\$828 k**

Potential costs: 7/1 – 12/30: **\$9.5 M**

Total: **\$10.4 M**

- Includes: COVID-related leave time such as sick pay and FMLA; and unemployment insurance.
- Projected costs include contingencies for full utilization of sick pay and FMLA for employees with school-aged children.
- Costs are eligible under CARES
- Variables: Utilization, further legislation on these costs is possible

Proposed allocation: \$500,000

- Lay-off aversion programs
- Workforce development programs
- Business grants
- Bulk purchasing of PPE for businesses

Possible programs include:

- Subsidies for those who don't qualify for existing subsidies for childcare
- Technical Assistance and bulk purchasing of PPE for providers
- Support for childcare programs





Social Safety Net

Proposed allocation: \$500,000

Possible programs include:

- Income replacement to support individuals under isolation and quarantine orders
- Emergency financial assistance





Housing/ Rental Assistance

Proposed allocation: \$500,000

Possible programs include:

Rental assistance



Considerations for Community Recovery Initiatives

- Community need
- Ability to deliver services by December
 30
- Ability to meet compliance requirements (federal procurement standards, single audit, etc)
- Efficient delivery of services/ability to minimize administrative burden
- Support for a sustainable, long-term recovery effort
