

This year's featured facility tour will be making stops at *three* unique facilities within the Boulder/Denver region.

Facility #1: Front Range Landfill

Located approximately 15 miles north of downtown Denver, Republic Services, Inc.'s 602-acre facility is permitted with a 202-acre disposal footprint. The landfill currently accepts 1,800 TPD of municipal solid waste, C&D debris, and pre-approved special wastes, with a projected life of over 20 years. Facility highlights include:

- A Materials Handling Facility allowing for unrestricted disposal of waste due to inclement weather or other possible closures
- A large-hauler capacity tipper
- Extensive LFG and Groundwater-Monitoring systems
- Leachate Collection and Removal System (LCRS)
- Computerized scalehouse with constant wind and radioactivity monitoring

Note: Plan for the tour to take the entire time allotted and please make travel arrangements accordingly. Casual attire is recommended for this tour, open-toed shoes, skirts, and shorts are NOT suggested. The tour will take place rain or shine. Personal vehicles will NOT be allowed onsite.

Facility #2: Denver Regional Landfill

Less than a quarter-mile from the Front Range Landfill lies Waste Connection, Inc.'s 160-acre Denver Regional Landfill. Considerably older than its larger neighbor, Denver Regional closed its northern cell in 1992 and expects a 2009 closing of its 7-million-ton southern cell. Both cells were constructed on a natural bedrock subgrade, with a 3-foot compacted clay liner and a 60 ml HDPE geomembrane liner. The landfill design also includes a separate leachate collection system, surface water control systems, and landfill gas management systems.

Facility #3: Western Disposal Services

Founded in 1970 with one truck and 1200 customers, Western Disposal Services has grown into Boulder County's largest waste and recyclables hauler, providing collection, recycling, and disposal services to over 35,000 residential and commercial customers. The company's operations center houses a transfer station, dispatch communications center, maintenance shop, and even a small bailing and composting operation. Tour participants will learn about how the company manages its current fleet of 80 trucks using advanced GIS and GPS tracking methods in conjunction with a fully integrated customer management system. Also located on the Western Disposal grounds (although run autonomously) is the Boulder County Household Hazardous Waste Facility.
