Project Narrative:

The purpose of this application is to obtain approval of a Use Permit to develop a new winery facility with an annual production capacity of 40,000 gallons.

Production will be met via the processing of fruit from an adjacent parcel (owned by the applicant) and fruit brought to the facility from other sources.

The subject parcel is 20 acres and is developed with an existing residence, barn and various agricultural out-buildings. The existing residence is served by a well/septic systems and is accessed via an existing driveway from Atlas Peak Road.

The proposed winery building will consist of two detached structures (3,187 sf + 2,603 sf) joined by a covered crush pad (1,658 sf). The winery building will accommodate production (laboratory, employee break room, equipment storage, restroom, etc) and accessory uses (hospitality room, hospitality patio, offices, conference room, etc).

The proposed cave development will consist of a total of 13,662 sf with access via three separate portals. One portal will be accessed from the new winery building, one will be accessed from the covered crush pad and the third will be accessed from the turn-around area located at the western portion of the project. The cave will be used primarily for production (13,242 sf) with the exception of one (420 sf) hospitality room.

The proposed winery development will include a new on-site wastewater treatment system, a new well and a portion of the cave will be dedicated to the storage of water. Please see the attached wastewater feasibility study and water use analysis studies for more detailed information.

The owner/applicant is exploring the possibility of including a photovoltaic system with a ground or roof mounted array to provide power to the proposed winery.

The project includes widening and lengthening of the existing driveway to Napa County Road & Street Standards. Additionally, the project will provide 7 parking spaces and has been designed to accommodate emergency vehicle access and turn-around movements.

The proposed marketing plan for the winery includes daily visitation of 20 guests (by appointment only), 10 marketing events annually with a maximum of 30 guests and one marketing event per year with a maximum of 100 guests. All events will be catered with food prepared off-site.

The winery will typically require 4 full-time and 3 part-time employees. During harvest on a weekday, there will be 5 full-time employees and 1 part-time employee and 3 full-time employees on a harvest Saturday.

The design of the winery includes elements which allow the structure to integrate seamlessly into the site. These elements include; native stone gabion walls, shotcrete and rusted-metal finishes, a compact floor plan/development area and low plate heights.

There are no Variances or Exceptions being requested under this Use Permit Application.

Hosted tours and tastings for wine industry personnel and consumers will be daily and by appointment only between the hours of 10:00 AM and 4:00 PM. Appointments will be limited to 20 people per day. Wine purchased on-premise may be consumed on-premise pursuant to Assembly Bill 2004.

Marketing events such as barrel tasting, auctions and other social events will be limited to 10 per year up to 30 people per event and 1 time a year for up to 100 people.

All events will be catered with food prepared off-site.

Portable toilets will be brought in for the 1 marketing event which will accommodate 100 guests.
