SUBJECT: Support for AB 556 (Limon) - Fines for Local Land Use and Development Codes

RECOMMENDATION

County Executive Officer on behalf of the Legislative Subcommittee seeks approval of and authorization for the Chair to communicate to the Legislature and pertinent parties support for AB 556 (Limon), as amended on April 24, 2017, a bill that gives local governments authority to increase fines for violations of special event permit requirements. (Unanimous vote required)

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

AB 556 will provide counties with authority to impose reasonable fines for violations of special event permit requirements. Local communities need the flexibility and tools to ensure public safety and traffic concerns are addressed. Current law sets the maximum fine for such violations at \$100 for the first violation, \$200 for the second, and \$500 for the third violation within the same year. AB 556 will increase the fines for event permit violations to \$1,000 for the first violation, \$2,000 for a second violation by the same owner or operators within five years, and \$5,000 for each additional occurrence by the same owner or operator within five years.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION: The proposed action is not a project as defined by 14 California Code of Regulations 15378 (State CEQA Guidelines) and therefore CEQA is not applicable.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The County of Santa Barbara is sponsoring AB 556 through its Assemblymember, Monique Limon, of the 37th District.

The Napa County Board of Supervisors' Legislative Subcommittee reviewed this legislation previously and recommended a support position to be considered by the full Board. However, the bill was amended since that meeting and before staff could present to the Board of Supervisors. The bill now applies only to violations of special event permits.

Santa Barbara County believes current fines are too low to incentivize individuals who have a one-time special event to go through the proper permitting process. Instead, it is easier to violate the Land Use and Development codes and pay the very low fine. Cities already have authority under existing law to impose higher fines than do counties. For example (provided by Santa Barbara County), a property owner could host a large commercial wedding for out-of-town residents and forego necessary permits in favor of a \$100 violation. A permit review would have addressed public safety, traffic concerns and other impacts to the neighborhood such as excessive noise from events of this magnitude. The fine of \$100 is insufficient to deter property owners who can easily absorb this as part of their routine business operating expense.

In response, AB 556 will increase the fines to:

- | \$1,000 for the first violation;
- | \$2,000 for a second violation by the same owner or operators within five years; and
- | \$5,000 for each additional violation by the same owner or operator within five years.
