Dear Mr. Trippl:

The Native American Heritage Commission (NAHC) has reviewed the Notice of Completion (NOC) referenced above. The California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) states that any project that causes a substantial adverse change in the significance of an historical resource, which includes archeological resources, is a significant effect requiring the preparation of an EIR (CEQA Guidelines 15064(b)). To comply with this provision the lead agency is required to assess whether the project will have an adverse impact on historical resources within the area of project effect (APE), and if so to mitigate that effect. To adequately assess and mitigate project-related impacts to archaeological resources, the NAHC recommends the following actions:

- ✓ Contact the appropriate regional archaeological Information Center for a record search. The record search will determine:
  - If a part or all of the area of project effect (APE) has been previously surveyed for cultural resources.
  - If any known cultural resources have already been recorded on or adjacent to the APE.
  - If the probability is low, moderate, or high that cultural resources are located in the APE.
  - If a survey is required to determine whether previously unrecorded cultural resources are present.
- ✓ If an archaeological inventory survey is required, the final stage is the preparation of a professional report detailing the findings and recommendations of the records search and field survey.
  - The final report containing site forms, site significance, and mitigation measurers should be submitted immediately to the planning department. All information regarding site locations, Native American human remains, and associated funerary objects should be in a separate confidential addendum, and not be made available for pubic disclosure.
  - The final written report should be submitted within 3 months after work has been completed to the appropriate regional archaeological Information Center.
- ✓ Contact the Native American Heritage Commission for:
  - A Sacred Lands File Check. USGS 7.5-minute quadrangle name, township, range, and section required
  - A list of appropriate Native American contacts for consultation concerning the project site and to assist in the mitigation measures. Native American Contacts List attached
- ✓ Lack of surface evidence of archeological resources does not preclude their subsurface existence.
  - Lead agencies should include in their mitigation plan provisions for the identification and evaluation of accidentally discovered archeological resources, per California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Guidelines §15064.5(f). In areas of identified archaeological sensitivity, a certified archaeologist and a culturally affiliated Native American, with knowledge in cultural resources, should monitor all ground-disturbing activities.
  - Lead agencies should include in their mitigation plan provisions for the disposition of recovered cultural items that
    are not burial associated, which are addressed in Public Resources Code (PRC) §5097.98, in consultation with
    culturally affiliated Native Americans.
  - Lead agencies should include provisions for discovery of Native American human remains in their mitigation plan. Health and Safety Code §7050.5, PRC §5097.98, and CEQA Guidelines §15064.5(e), address the process to be followed in the event of an accidental discovery of any human remains and associated grave goods in a location other than a dedicated cemetery.

# Dear Planning Commission:

The Mount Veeder Stewardship Council submits the following letter in Opposition to the Hall Winery Distillery Building Demolition Application currently pending before the Napa County Planning Commission, and urges the Planning Commission.

The goal of the Mount Veeder Stewardship Council is to encourage sustainability of our natural resources and to ensure that the rich biodiversity and rural quality of life in the private and public lands of our pristine watershed are respected, conserved and protected for future generations through education, local community involvement and outreach to government and business stakeholders. At this time, the Mount Veeder Stewardship Council is concerned about the approval of new uses for water, during this serious drought.

Based upon our review of the Draft Environmental Impact Report, it is our opinion that the Planning Commission should not approve the proposed demolition of the Distillery Building, for several reasons.

# Notice to Neighbors

In Napa County, with a large percentage of properties located in the County, the notice which was provided to neighboring properties, only those neighbors who own a property within 300 feet of the project property, were provided notice. Given the fact that the impact of the project extends well beyond 300 feet of the subject parcel, the notice by the County should really be extended to a distance of 1,000 feet of the subject parcel, to alert neighbors to the proposed project and allow them to contact the applicant directly or contact the County regarding their concerns for the proposed project.

#### The Draft EIR Fails to Address the Greenhouse Gas Impacts of the Project

The Draft Environmental Impact Report (hereinafter "Draft EIR") fails to address what greenhouse gas emissions will be created during the demolition of the Distillery Building. Apparently, the applicant's consultant has presumed that the building will just evaporate. There is no discussion of how the demolition will occur, the types of emissions created during the demolition and subsequent hauling off of the remains of the building. The number of trips and types of vehicles necessary to remove all the debris and the greenhouse gas emissions given off during the demolition and removal process by said vehicles.

#### The Draft EIR Fails to Address Water

The Draft EIR fails to even mention the amount of water used during the demolition of the Distillery Building and subsequent removal from the property.

#### The Draft EIR Fails to Address Traffic

The Draft EIR fails to even mention the amount of traffic generated by the demolition of the Distillery Building and the subsequent removal of the debris from the property.

## The Draft EIR Fails to Mention the Cumulative Environmental Impacts of the Project

The Draft EIR fails to even mention the cumulative environmental impacts of the project. An analysis of cumulative impacts should consider all predictable and cumulative impacts such as traffic, noise, waste water, water, air quality and the carbon footprint of the project and how that impacts those of us who live in the County of Napa.

The Mount Veeder Stewardship Council objects to the adoption of the Draft EIR as it is currently written for the Hall Winery's removal of the Distillery Building. The Draft EIR only addresses issues relating to lead, asbestos and the historic significance of the Distillery Building, and fails to address other environmental issues created during the demolition and removal of the debris from the historic building.

A record search of the sacred land file has failed to indicate the presence of Native American cultural resources in the immediate project area. The absence of specific site information in the sacred lands file does not indicate the absence of cultural resources in any project area. Other sources of cultural resources should also be contacted for information regarding known and recorded sites.

Enclosed is a list of Native Americans individuals/organizations who may have knowledge of cultural resources in the project area. The Commission makes no recommendation or preference of a single individual, or group over another. This list should provide a starting place in locating areas of potential adverse impact within the proposed project area. I suggest you contact all of those indicated, if they cannot supply information, they might recommend others with specific knowledge. By contacting all those listed, your organization will be better able to respond to claims of failure to consult with the appropriate tribe or group. If a response has not been received within two weeks of notification, the Commission requests that you follow-up with a telephone call to ensure that the project information has been received.


