### **ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT**

### **BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION**

There are currently three openings due to resignations on the State Council on Developmental Disabilities - Area Board 4 that are appointed by the Napa County Board of Supervisors. The County Executive Office has recruited

for the openings and received the one application listed above. The Executive Director of Area Board 4 has reviewed the application and recommends appointment.

The Area Board consists of seventeen (17) members, five (5) of whom are appointed by the Governor and four (4) by the Boards of Supervisors of each of the Counties involved (Napa, Solano and Sonoma). The Area Board consists of persons with developmental disabilities or the parents or legal guardians of such persons, and the public at large. Area Boards were created by state law to make sure people who have developmental disabilities and their families get the services they need. They work to make sure that services are of good quality and also advocate for persons with developmental disabilities to become more integrated into their communities. There are thirteen (13) Area Boards in California.

On January 1, 2003, the Area Boards were merged with the State Council on Developmental Disabilities. Since Area Boards are funded by the federal government, they serve people who have developmental disabilities as defined by federal law.

This office will continue to advertise for the remaining vacancies
