## **RECOMMENDATION**

Approval of and authorization for the Chair and certain County officers to sign a letter supporting continued federal funding for the Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities program. (Unanimous vote required)

### EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

President Bush has proposed eliminating the federal funding component for the state grant portion of the Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities program. Currently, this is the only source of federal funding received by Napa County schools for school-based drug and alcohol abuse prevention programs, including individual and group counseling services. This funding assists the schools in promoting a climate of prevention with regard to alcohol, drugs, tobacco and violence issues.

Continued funding for this program is urged by the Napa County Juvenile Justice Coordinating Council. The Board of Supervisors' legislative subcommittee recommends approval of and authorization for the Chair and certain County officers to sign a letter urging continued federal funding of the Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities program.

### ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT

#### BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

President Bush has proposed eliminating the federal funding component for the state grant portion of the Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities program. Currently, this is the only source of federal funding received by Napa County schools for school-based drug and alcohol abuse prevention programs, including individual and group counseling services. This funding assists the schools in promoting a climate of prevention with regard to alcohol, drugs, tobacco and violence issues.

In Napa County, these funds serve 19,000 students. The funds allow the schools to prepare parent resources, such as Building and Promoting Asset Development for Youth, a publication that is distributed through the local newspaper and school offices. The Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities program also provides parents information about alcohol, drug and tobacco use, suggests family oriented activities, and lists agencies parents can contact when they need assistance.

Without this funding, the schools would lose their prevention coordinator, who provides materials and professional development to teachers, as well as the counselors who work directly with students having drug and alcohol issues. Napa County continues to work to reduce teen alcohol and drug use, which pose serious problems for the community. Schools play a critical role in getting the anti-drug message to kids and require continued federal funding in order to provide this important drug and alcohol abuse prevention program.

Board approval and authorization is requested for the Chair and the following County officers to sign a letter of sport for the Safe and Drug Free Schools and Communities program:
