ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION: The proposed action is not a project as defined by 14 California Code of Regulations 15378 (State CEQA Guidelines) and therefore CEQA is not applicable.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The Library received a \$3,000 grant from the American Library Association (ALA) to facilitate the Latino Americans: 500 Years of History project. The Director of Library Services and Community Outreach requests approval to accept this grant.

This project will support exploration of the rich and varied history and experiences of Latinos, who have helped shape the United States over the last five centuries and who have become, with more than 50 million people, the country's largest minority group. The cornerstone of the project is the six-part, National Endowment for the Humanities (NEH)-supported 2013 documentary film, "Latino Americans." This award-winning series chronicles Latinos in the United States from the 16th century to present day.

The programs the Library will present as part of this project are screenings of the PBS documentary "Latino Americans," followed by a discussion of the film with a local scholar; a storyteller at the community's annual Dia de los Muertos event; and a presentation of interviews of local farmworkers in honor of Cesar Chavez Day.
