SUBJECT: SB 52 (Dodd) State of Emergency: local emergency: sudden and severe energy shortage:

planned power outage

RECOMMENDATION

County Executive Officer seeks discussion and possible action on SB 52 (Dodd) that would make a deenergization event, also known as Public Safety Power Shutoff (PSPS), one of the conditions constituting a state of emergency and a local emergency.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

SB 52 (Dodd) expands the definition of "sudden and severe energy shortage" to include a "deenergization event," defined as a planned power outage (PSPS), as specified, and would make a PSPS one of those conditions constituting a state of emergency and a local emergency.

In 2020, Senator Dodd introduced a more expansive bill that included the provisions in SB 52, which the County cosponsored because it would allow for possible reimbursements through the California Emergency Services Act.

Staff is requesting the Legislative Subcommittee direct staff to write a letter of support or co-sponsor, if requested by the author, consistent with the State Legislative and Regulatory Platform, bypassing the Board of Supervisors, and submitting it directly to interested parties.

ENVIRONMENTAL DETERMINATION: The proposed action is not a project as defined by 14 California Code of Regulations 15378 (State CEQA Guidelines) and therefore CEQA is not applicable.

BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

Synopsis and Background

Under existing Law, the California Emergency Services Act (CESA), authorizes the State and local officials to proclaim a state of emergency or local emergency, when certain conditions exist. Existing law defines the terms "state of emergency" and "local emergency" to mean a duly proclaimed existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state or local government, and among other things, a "sudden energy shortage." It is unclear whether a PSPS is considered a sudden energy shortage for purposes of utilizing the CESA, which could potentially provide reimbursements to local agencies for costs incurred during a PSPS.

SB 52 will clarify that a PSPS is one of the conditions constituting a state of emergency and a local emergency.
