#### BACKGROUND AND DISCUSSION

The Brown Act or "Open Meeting Law" is officially known as the Ralph M. Brown Act and is found the California Government Code Section 54950. The Brown Act was enacted in 1953 to guarantee the public's right to attend and participate in meetings of local legislative bodies, and as a response to growing concerns about local government officials' practice of holding meetings that were not in compliance with advance public notice requirements. The Brown Act is important in enabling the public to participate in the decision making process.
