SUBJECT: Authorization to Sign Agreement Using Agency Funds to Remove Waste Oil and other HHW

Equipment from St. Helena and Yountville Sites

RECOMMENDATION

DECOMMISSIONING OF YOUNTVILLE AND ST. HELENA USED OIL AND HHW COLLECTION SITES

DISCUSSION AND REQUESTED ACTION: Upper Valley Waste Management Agency Manager requests approval of and authorization to sign an agreement with Clean Harbors for a maximum of \$25,000 for the term of May 20, 2019 to June 30, 2019 to assist Yountville and St. Helena with decommissioning of their used oil and household hazardous waste (HHW) collection sites.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Over 10 years ago the County, Agency, Yountville and St. Helena partnered to install used oil collection tanks, as well as establish collections of other forms of HHW. Both jurisdictions now want to get out of that role, and would like the used oil tanks and related HHW equipment removed. Used oil funding cannot be used for tank removal, and neither the cities nor the county has excess funding to support this. Given that this waste collection function is within the scope of Agency responsibilities, and that funding is available in fund balance, staff requests the Board authorize the Agency Manager to sign contracts to spend up to \$25,000 (total) assisting these Member jurisdictions to close down their respective sites.
